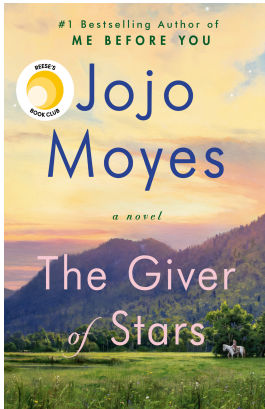

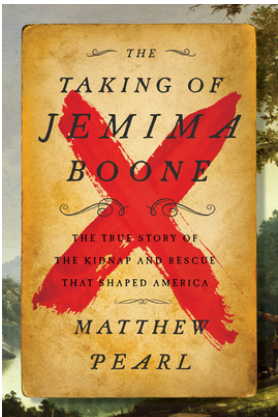
Kentucky:

The Giver of Stars by Jojo Moyes, F Moyer, Libby e-audio & e-book



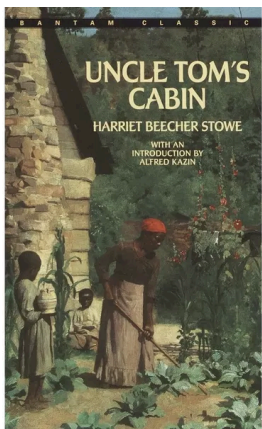

And though they face all kinds of dangers, they're committed to their job: bringing books to people who have never had any, arming them with facts that will change their lives.

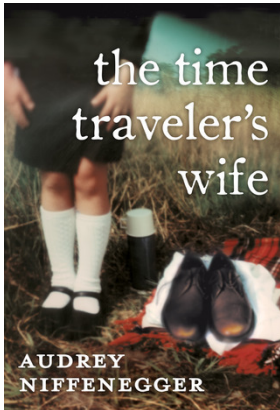
Uncle Tom's Cabin by Harriet Beecher Stowe, F Stow, Libby and hoopla e-audio & e-book

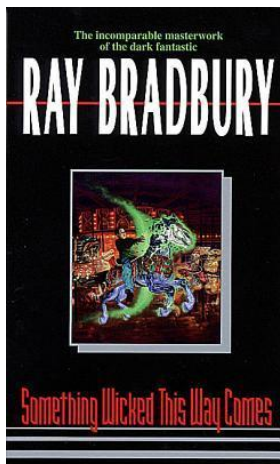

The Time Traveler's Wife by Audrey Niffenegger, Libby e-audio & e-book, hoopla e-book



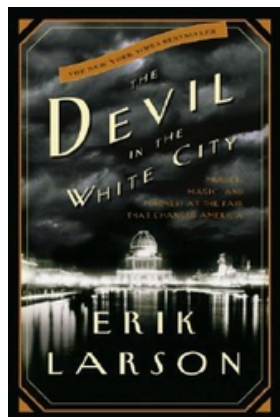

In the face of this force they can neither prevent nor control, Henry and Clare's struggle to lead normal lives is both intensely moving and entirely unforgettable.

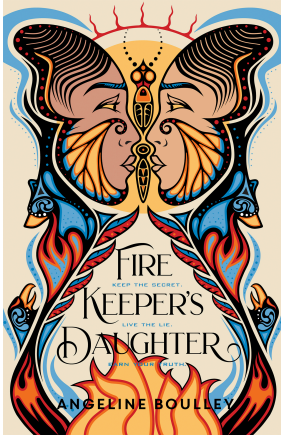

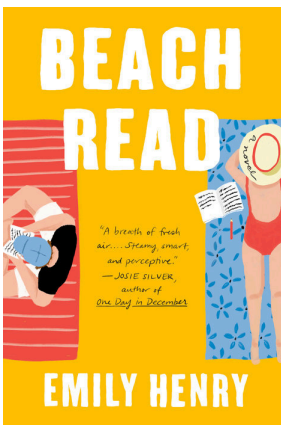

Firekeeper's Daughter by Angeline Boulley. T Boul, TEEN BOCD Boulley, Libby e-audio & e-book, hoopla e-audio



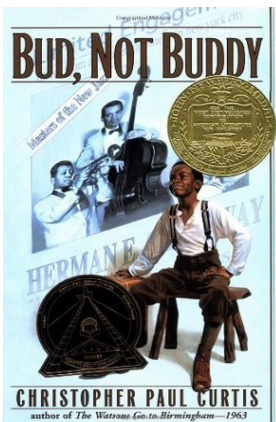

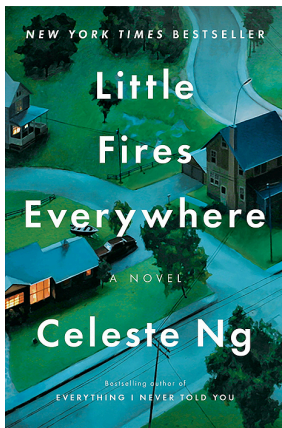
Bud, Not Buddy by Christopher Paul Curtis, JA Curt, Libby e-audio & e-book

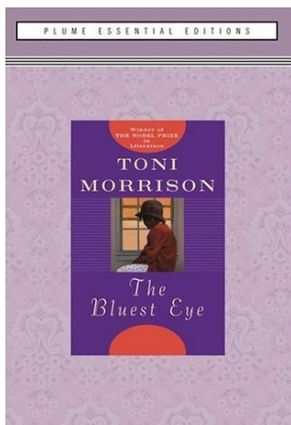

Little Fires Everywhere by Celeste Ng, F Ng, Libby e-audio & e-book



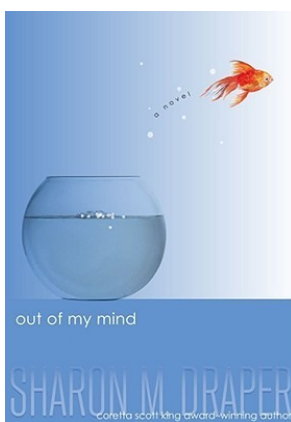

In the autumn of 1941, the year the marigolds in the Breedloves' garden do not bloom. Pecola's life does change—in painful, devastating ways. With its vivid evocation of the fear and loneliness at the heart of a child's yearning, and the tragedy of its fulfillment. *The Bluest Eye* remains one of Toni Morrison's most powerful, unforgettable novels- and a significant work of American fiction.
