




Breakfast of Champions by Kurt Vonnegut, F Vonn, Libby e-book & e-audio









The Sun and Her Flowers by Rupi Kaur, LITERATURE POETRY Kaur, Libby and Hoopla e-book





It focuses on themes of love and loss, trauma and abuse, healing, femininity and the body. Wilting touches on the subject of heartbreak and loss. Falling focuses on depressive feelings following the loss of an important relationship. Rooting explores topics of immigration and borders. Blooming addresses the joy Kaur finally found coming to love and accept her roots, herself, and the world around her.

On May 4, 1970, the Ohio National Guard gunned down unarmed college students protesting the Vietnam War at Kent State University. In a deadly barrage of 67 shots, 4 students were killed and 9 shot and wounded. It was the day America turned guns on its own children—a shocking event burned into our national memory. A few days prior, 10-year-old Derf Backderf saw those same Guardsmen patrolling his nearby hometown, sent in by the governor to crush a trucker strike. *Kent State: Four Dead in Ohio* is a moving and troubling story about the bitter price of dissent—as relevant today as it was in 1970.
